The Confucius Institute was established in partnership with Hangzhou Normal University in China, with the sponsorship and authorization of the Office of Chinese Language Council International (Hanban), under the Ministry of Education, China.

The mission of the Confucius Institute is to enhance the understanding of Chinese Language and culture, facilitate engagement with China and create opportunities for exchange and collaboration between communities in Tennessee and China. The Institute seeks to become a hub for China-related activities and a resource center for Chinese language, history, contemporary society and culture.



### Advance Readers and the Benefits Of Reading To Your Child

It is so important to begin reading to your child when they are just an infant. Some parents even begin reading to their children before they are born. As your child listens to you read to them, they are developing in so many ways. Your child is learning the rudiments of language, and they will try to repeat the sounds and the cadence of your voice as she grows and matures. Reading is an excellent way to encourage your child to learn new words and expand their vocabulary.

Reading opens up a world which is virtually inaccessible to those who are illiterate. People who are literate rarely have limits, unless they have set those limits upon themselves. Reading inspires learning. Prolific readers desire knowledge, and that desire never stops. Children who are read to as infants and continue to read throughout their academic years have a better chance of attending college and graduate school, and they have more success in their subsequent employment.
